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
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SOMETHING NEW

How does God lead us to do something new?

We can fool ourselves into thinking we are completely in control of starting something new. We make a plan. Stick to the plan. And see the plan come to fruition. Usually, however, it's not that simple.



Planning and preparation aren't bad when starting something new, we just need to realize God might have a completely different, and often surprising set of twists and turns.

For the first three Sunday mornings in January, we will be learning how God started a new church, using Paul and his team, in a city called Philippi. Strange as it may seem, the first three converts to join this new church were: a businesswoman who specialized in purple goods, a slave girl recovering from demon possession, and a jail-

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er who had nearly committed suicide. Now, my guess is that no one in a planning room, weeks before going to Philippi, would ever draw up the beginning membership of the church to include the three core people that we are going to learn about in Acts chapter 16. But, God's plan does include a seller of purple goods, a once demon possessed slave girl and a formerly suicidal jailer.

This is where we need to admit when we are starting something new it is important to roll with the changes that God brings along. It is great to make plans and prepare. It is just fine to make goals for the New Year.

Set your resolutions and go forward in the new things you believe God is calling you to do - BUT - be ready to receive God's surprise blessings and changes to your plan.

THE FIRST GIFT Matthew 2:1-12

Christmas is my favorite time of year. I love Advent and the anticipation of Christ's arrival. I love the smell of evergreen and roasting chestnuts. I love the brilliance of Christmas bulbs strung on homes and trees that bring



light to the darkness. I love the warmth of a fire while watching the snow gently fall to ground. And I love the traditions of Christmas too. I love how we hang the greens, light the advent candles, sing Christmas carols, and how we celebrate by coming together with family and friends around the table to share in a meal and recognize the gift we were given those many thousands of years ago.

But have you ever stopped to think about how quickly Christmas goes. Preparations begin as early as September, but the day after Christmas everything seasonal is on sale. But, it's still Christmas...at least for the church it is. Christmastide only ends with the arrival of Epiphany on January 6. Epiphany celebrates the arrival of the wise men to worship Jesus.

Tradition holds that three wise men followed the star to Bethlehem. Every nativity scene, whether on the front of a church bulletin or the ones you have at home will bear witness to the "truth" of the

There's even a Christmas carol dedicated to these characters: "We Three Kings." But, if you look in the scripture there is no reference to the number of wise men. The scripture simply says that there were wise men; that they came from the East; and that they followed a star to Jerusalem seeking the child who was born king of the Jews.

The scripture also tells us that the wise men opened their treasure chests and offered Jesus three gifts - gold, frankincense and myrrh. Perhaps it's from the identification of the three gifts that tradition has inferred there were three kings.

Three gifts...three kings. Three kings...three gifts. Gold... frankincense...and myrrh.

But, were there really just three gifts that fateful day when the wise men followed the star and called on Mary and found her with Jesus?

If we look to scripture we will find that the first gift the wise men presented was not myrrh. It was not frankincense. And it wasn't even gold.

Let's look at Matthew 2:11:

¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

Before opening their treasure-chests and offering the child Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, first they gave him the greatest gift of all. In humility, in reverence, and in submission, they knelt down and paid him homage. The word in Greek that is translated as "paid him homage" refers to the custom of prostrating oneself at the feet of a king. The imagery is clear and dramatically expresses the idea of giving not just gifts, but our entire selves to Christ.

However, verse eleven is not the first time we encounter the idea of paying homage. In verse two, the wise men

came to Jerusalem asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." And in verse eight we see the duplicity of Herod when, after hearing from the wise men the exact time when the star had appeared, he sent them to Bethlehem saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

But the irony of Herod's situation is that in sending the wise

men to Bethlehem, he unknowingly states the truth of what he needs to do. Herod the despot. Herod the fear monger. Herod, empowered by Caesar to do anything and everything necessary to maintain Rome's absolute dominion, even the murder he would later perpetrate on the children of Bethlehem, needs to prostrate himself before the compassion, justice and grace incarnate in the child the wise men are seeking.

What gets lost in the pageantry, carols and Epiphany celebrations is that the wise men do not immediately present their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The first thing they do upon entering the house and seeing Mary and the child is to kneel down and pay him homage. Only after this act of worship, of completely surrendering themselves to Christ do they present their other gifts.

The order of the actions is significant. Before anything else...homage. In kneeling and paying homage the wise men express their relationship to Christ. First homage. First worship. First giving themselves completely to Christ. Then they offer their other gifts.

The wise men's first gift was homage. What will your first gift to the Christ child be?

BAPTISM & MEMBERSHIP

Voting members (who are 18 and older) vote on who is on the Executive Board, have a right to vote on property decisions, and the hiring and firing of pastoral staff. Membership is not required to participate in the life of our church, however it is a show of commitment to the work of Christ here in this part of the world. MY DAILY DARKNESS

The word "darkness" paints a vivid picture for us. We all know what darkness is—especially this time of year. It creeps in early, cannot be ignored, and gets in the way of all we are trying to accomplish. Dangerous hazards hide in the darkness, trying to con-



vince us they don't exist, until we trip on them and they leave their scars in our lives.

We are mesmerized by a giant yellow moon, the stars forming shapes above us, the flickering of a flame, a candle cutting through the abyss or a warm, twinkling strand of lights. Light gives us hope, calms our fears and helps us to see our way.

Darkness had fallen on the world. In a moment when our selfishness showed its true colors, humanity took the apple and opened the floodgate of sin and darkness. The darkness in our hearts poured out and we were left blinded by our sin. Through the years, since the garden, the prophets had spoken about the coming of a light—a light that would show us a way out of our sinfulness, out of the dark.

Isaiah 9:2

² The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone."

And again in Isaiah 60:1-3

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.
 For behold, darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will arise upon you, and his glory will be seen upon you.
 And nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your rising.

After the prophets, the waiting continued - until the day the of John the Baptist. John wandered out of the wilderness proclaiming the arrival of the Light:

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made. ⁴ In him was life, and the life was the light of men. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

⁶There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. ⁸He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light.

⁹ The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world was made through him, yet the world did not know him. ¹¹ He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. ¹² But to all who did re-

ceive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

Finally, a solution to the darkness that envelops humanity.

His name is Jesus, the Light of the world, sent of the Father, that we may walk in His Light again.

You may be thinking, this sounds an awful lot like an Advent article, not a New Year's article and you are right, it is. My question for you though is this, "How will you take your Advent convictions


with you into the New Year?" We paused, we reflected, and we experienced the awe of Advent, but it's January now, and life goes on. I'm not talking about a New Year's Resolution to keep Advent with you. Instead, I am calling for a daily resolution. Remember your darkness daily. But also remember that the Light has come. The truth of this Light should affect the way we live daily.

I don't know about you, but I am tired of making New Year's goals that only last through March (ok, more like February). Don't get me wrong, I want to change and grow in the New Year, maybe more than I ever have. But I have come to believe the best way to make that happen is to intentionally set aside time daily to ponder the reality of my condition. I have been saved from my darkness and it is now my job to bear witness to the Light.

Here are some daily questions to ask:

- What obstacles will I face today that may keep me from sharing the light of Jesus?
- What will my strategies be to address those obstacles?
- How did I do yesterday in sharing the light of Jesus?
- What do I need to change about myself to be a better witness and how can I work toward that change today?
- Is there someone in my life who is stumbling in the darkness?
- ♦ How can I point them toward the light?

My goal is to make 2018 a year to witness the Light. Not by setting lofty goals but, instead, by living intentionally daily. The Light has come! Praise be to God for not leaving us blinded in darkness. Thank you, Jesus, for being a light unto my path. Light each of my days and lead me down your path.
