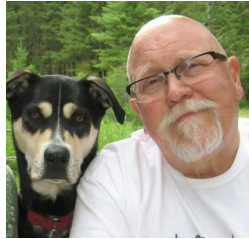

SCRIPTURE & THE SPIRIT

Sometimes, when given a task with an outcome which determines your grade in a class, you move ahead blindly without much acknowledgment of its weight and validity. Let's be clear, this was almost light-years ago; Fall Quarter 1969, Northwest Christian College, New Testament Literature, Professor Alger Fitch. The class focused on everything following the Gospels up to Revelation - Acts thru Jude. Monday through Friday, 9 AM to 10 AM, one hour each day and a new scripture memorized each day. To help us determine the focus of the why and wherefore of this memorization, our first scripture we memorized was 2 Timothy 3:16-17. The Message presents that scripture this way -

"Every part of Scripture is God-breathed and useful one way or another - showing us truth, exposing our rebellion, correcting our mistakes, training us to live God's way. Through the Word we are put together and shaped up for the tasks God has for us."

The ESV finishes verse 17 this way -

"that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work."

Pretty clear, right? It should have been crystal clear. But, being a newly married, 20-year-old, still a bit of a rudderless child, and not clear of my compass-heading for life, I memorized each day and stored them in my mind palace for withdrawal at some further date.

Then the day came we were to memorize Romans 8:26-27-

"Likewise, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words. And he who searches hearts knows what is in the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God."

"As I laid in bed trying to clear the cobwebs and trying to pray, but not knowing the words to use, a calm spread over me and that deposit I made years ago came flooding back to me—For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words."

For some reason, at that moment years ago, I spent my effort more on the mere memorization and less in the understanding of the text I had learned. However, it was tucked away into my mind palace for retrieval or withdrawal at a moment's notice.

Fast forward eight years, now 28, I found myself laid down - battered and bruised from a motor vehicle accident. I was alone, while Carol and our daughter were both in the hospital. Our world had been shattered and I was hanging on for the ride. Carol had a fractured pelvis, and our daughter, Amy, had multiple skull fractures, a right-sided paralysis, and couldn't speak due to a bruise on her brain. I was in a haze, not knowing what the future might hold for our daughter. Carol would heal, but at just 2 years and 6 months, Amy's future was uncertain. As I laid in bed trying to clear the cobwebs and trying to pray, but not know-

ing the words to use, a calm spread over me and that deposit I made years ago came flooding back to me -

"For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words."

I had to claim that promise, as I was tongue tied with grief. The spirit did intercede for me and an overwhelming sense of peace enveloped me. The next few days and weeks weren't easy to bear, but that promise always brought me back to a sense of assuredness that things would work out.

Carol's fractured pelvis healed. Four days in the intensive care unit and Amy was out to a private room, and another four days later she was discharged home. She still had the paralysis and was unable to speak, but that sweet little girl was alive and mending. Less than 30 days later, early in the morning, she pulled herself up in her crib and spoke in a full sentence. A month later, the therapy groups - speech therapy and physical therapy - declared that even though they loved seeing her and being in her presence, she had progressed to the point that they had to say goodbye and discharged her from her daily visits. The medical school declared her recovery a miracle and said a higher power had had a hand in her recovery. We felt blessed!

My daily memorizations had set me onto a road of peace. We were lucky. These things don't always end in such a miracle, but the healing power of God's love is always there - His Word is there for us. And as Timothy said -

"Through the Word we are put together and shaped up for the tasks God has for us."

Through the years, Carol and I often have recounted that story. One time in particular, around 1980, we shared it with a couples with kids Bible study we attended. One of the couples was Jim and Linda. Jim was a Vietnam era veteran, and Linda a wonderful mom dealing with Multiple Sclerosis. Our friendship endured through the years, and though they moved away from the area, we remained in touch. Then one day, I received a text message from Jim with a message that Linda was near death. His next text was this: "What was that scripture you shared with us years ago? The one that was comforting to you when Amy was injured. I need it and I want to share it with my family, we are hurting and not sure how to pray."

That kind of a text message is not deserving of a text message answer - it requires a call, and a through the phone hug. Not an easy call to make, but that scripture helped relieve a lot of pain, and allowed us to reconnect, with Jesus wrapping his arms around us both.

Linda did pass away in a day or two. The text messages kept flowing between us and the pain eased into celebrating Linda's life. A couple of weeks later, we gathered with mutual friends and Jim and Linda's family to celebrate her life. The bulletin cover had one scripture - Romans 8:26. Jim met us at the door that day, physical hugs were exchanged, and he looked me in the eye and said thank you for the sharing you did years ago and thanks for your friendship. The spirit is here to help us in unknown ways every day, and in that I rejoice.

So, thank you Alger Fitch for making us memorize! Thank you, Apostle Paul, for your writing to the Romans and using those God-breathed words.

Now - go memorize a scripture!

PENTECOST: A HARVEST OF THE SPIRIT

50 days. That's 7 weeks plus 1 day. A lot can happen in 50 days.

In 50 days, God took the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt to hearing His voice at Mt. Sinai.

In the Old Testament, God commanded the Hebrew people to have a feast of harvest 50 days after Passover and the Feast of the Firstfruits (Leviticus 23). It was called the Feast of Weeks, or, because it was 50 days after Passover, it also was called "Pentecost" which means 50 in Greek.

Passover was to remember the rescue God accomplished for the Hebrew people. God's relationship did not end with their rescue, just like for a Christian our relationship with God is only really a beginning - there is much more to follow. Pentecost is a continuation of the story. Seven weeks after Moses and the Hebrews left Egypt they were at Mt. Sinai. The original Pentecost is connected to the mountain of smoke, fire, thunder, and lightning, but also, importantly, it was when Yahweh declared the 10 Commandments to His people. So, originally that day was about receiving God's Truth - His gift to us of the Law. Over time, as the Jewish people settled in the Holy Land, the Pentecost holiday (called Shavuot by Jews) became more associated with farming and God's provision (Deut. 16).

Pentecost has themes of: God's continued story with us, the giving of the Law, and God's provision.

Enter Jesus. After Jesus' resurrection, He spends time with the Disciples and others teaching them and preparing them for their mission as His people, the Church. Then, He ascends to heaven (Acts 1). But His plan was not to leave the Church alone, He was going to give the "Helper" or "Counselor" - the Holy Spirit.



Jesus Christ is God. He was God when the Law was given at Sinai, and Jesus' plan was for a continuation of His story, a new Pentecost. This time, God would give us the Spirit that could actually indwell believers because we have been made holy by Christ. We could have the Law written not just on tablets of stone but on our hearts by the Spirit (Jer. 31, Romans 2).

The Holy Spirit is God. On the first Christian Pentecost, the Holy Spirit was given to the Church (Acts 2). On that dramatic day, the Holy Spirit empowered people to hear the Good News of Jesus in whatever language they knew best. Divisions were torn down as the Spirit brought faith and unity. This is the Birthday of the Church.

Christian Pentecost has themes of: God's continued story with us, the giving of the Spirit, unity, and God's provision. The story doesn't end after Jesus leaves, it continues into its next stage, the stage we are still in, the age of the Holy Spirit, where God's presence is given to the Church to empower us to be His Body on earth. The Spirit provides what we need to be the Church - the Spirit leads us into Truth, the Spirit gives us gifts to serve, the Spirit convicts us of sin, of our need for righteousness and that there will be a judgment (John 16:8).

Christian Pentecost is about a Harvest of The Spirit. What does that mean? It means that we celebrate that the Spirit really is working in the world through followers of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit really is producing virtuous fruits in the lives of Christians (Galatians 6). The Holy Spirit really is helping people come to faith in Jesus every day around the world. The Holy Spirit wants to help us become people who overcome what divides people in this world, so that all can know the deep love of God. If anything truly good comes out of a local church, it happens as a Harvest of what the Holy Spirit is doing. This should be taught, recognized, and honored. The Holy Spirit is the life of the Church.

What is Life Lessons? An outreach ministry to local graduating high school seniors.

What do you do? We have three "sessions" where we get together at a local church, have dessert and get to know each other.

What is taught? The first session is on "Finances, the second "Relationships and the third "Your Future."

What else do you do? The students also are required to meet once with a Christian mentor for at least an hour to discuss topics of their choosing.

Who is involved? We are led and staffed by Christian men and women from Palouse Federated Church, Garfield Community Church, Garfield Christian Fellowship and GarPal Young Life.

What's in it for the students? They get wisdom, stories, and ice cream. If they finish the program, completing all three classes and participating in the mentoring session, they also receive a \$250 award.

How can I help? Pray. Pray for high school seniors. Pray for their life trajectory (we talk about that a lot). Pray for their parents and families, the transition can be everything from exciting to joyful to terrifying.

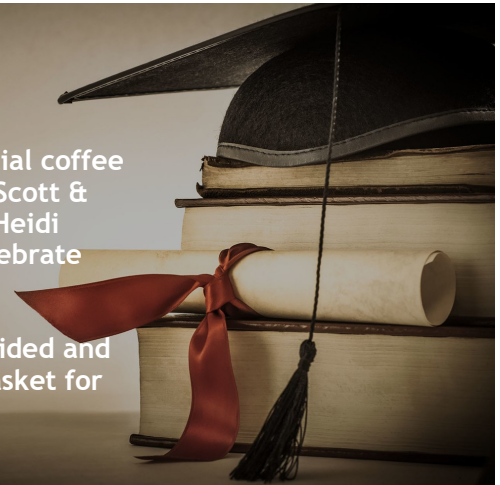
How else can I help? Give. Consider giving a gift to keep Life Lessons going another year. We have reserved funds to pay the scholarships, and we have enough for the 2018 class, but we want to keep doing this for years to come. GOD OF THE IMPOSSIBLE

Have you ever been in a situation that seemed hopeless? No matter how you spin the end of the story in your mind you cannot come up with a good resolution? Our society struggles with hopelessness. Too many people, both young and old, just give up. They cannot see a good way out, and they have no hope of change, no hope of freedom. They try harder to solve their problems, try harder to change their lives, try harder to find a way out - but nothing seems to work. And as hard as they try, they cannot fix the situation. Often, their hopelessness leads them to do something desperate, something life-altering or even life-ending. Brothers and sisters, I have good news for you we have reason to hope! We serve a God who specializes in impossible situations. We serve a God of restoration.

There are so many examples in the Bible of God restoring the broken. Of course, there are all the healing miracles Jesus performed. Every time He or one of His disciples cast a demon out of a person He gave them back their lives, saving them from what anyone would have considered hopeless. The Bible is filled with hope. One of my favorite examples comes from the Old Testament prophet Ezekiel. There is a beautiful story of God accomplishing the impossible in Ezekiel 37:1-10.

"The hand of the Lord was upon me, and he brought me out in the Spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of the valley; it was full of bones. And he led me around among them, and behold, there were very many on the surface of the valley, and behold, they were very dry. And he said to me, 'Son of man, can these bones live?' And I answered, 'O Lord God, you know.'" Then he said to me, "Prophesy over these bones, and say to them, O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: Behold, I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. And I will lay sinews upon you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live, and you shall know that I am the Lord." So I prophesied as I was commanded. And as I prophesied, there was a sound, and behold, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. And I looked, and behold, there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them. But

there was no breath in them. Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath; prophesy, son of man, and say to the breath, Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe on these slain, that they may live." So I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived and stood on their feet, an exceedingly great army."

I believe this story from Ezekiel is one of the most encouraging scriptures in the Bible. Who can take dry and dusty bones, put them together and breathe life into them? Our God, of course! He did it right there in front of Ezekiel's eyes. Ezekiel witnessed God accomplishing the impossible, bringing life where there only was death. I thought of this very story several weeks ago when Pastor Corey was preaching on Mark 10:27, "*Jesus looked at them and said, 'With man this is impossible, but not with God. For all things are possible with God.'*" He then went on to explain the best translation of the Greek is, "Impossible is not a thing for God."

As humans, we deal with limitations every day and we tend to place those limitations on our God as well. If impossible situations were left for humans to solve on our own, we would all be in trouble. No matter how hard we try, there are some situations that we cannot fix, cannot force, cannot handle. Left to our own skills and devices, we have no hope at all. But, I have hope in the God who breathes life into dry bones. You see, impossible is not a thing for God. When we see "impossible" God sees an opportunity.

"Who can take dry and dusty bones, put them together and breathe life into them? Our God, of course!"

Christians do not have all of the answers. We still face many situations we do not know how to handle, problems we don't know how to solve—and that is ok. However, we do have reason to hope. We have a God who loves us so much he sent His perfect Son to die for us. His love for us is perfect, and impossible is not a thing for Him.

Maybe you or someone you know is struggling with hopelessness. Maybe you are in a situation that you just see no way out of. Perhaps you are broken and exhausted and tired of "trying harder." Stop struggling my friend. Surrender to the God of hope, the God who breathes life into dry bones. Remember the words of Jesus and think of Him speaking directly to you as He says, "I know this situation is impossible for you. But impossible is not a thing for my Father—and He is your father too. Let Dad handle this."

PFC TO INSTALL AED



The church recently purchased an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to have on site in the event of an emergency.

What is an AED?
"An AED is a portable device that checks the heart rhythm and can also send an electric shock to the heart to try to restore a normal rhythm. AEDs are used to treat sudden cardiac arrest." (National Institutes of Health)

The AED is not a substitute for emergency services, but a useful tool for those critical first moments of a cardiac arrest, while waiting for emergency crews to arrive.



The new AED will soon be placed in a prominent location and we'll make sure you know where it is!

Also, importantly, we need to be trained in how to use it. Several in our congregation already are trained in using the AED, but we want to make sure that others, including outside groups that use the facility, also have an opportunity to be trained so that in the event something were to happen while in the building they would feel confident in using it. We are hoping to have a training in May - so be on the lookout in the church bulletin, announcements and weekly e-mail for more details. If you're interested in receiving training, contact Pastor Corey and we'll make sure you know when it happens!

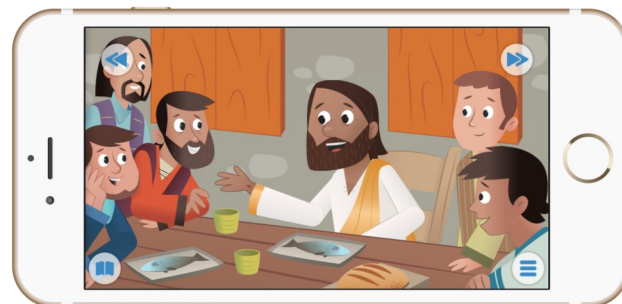
