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
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GRIEF IS LOVE

I sit here in our home in Newburgh, Indiana, looking out the window at an overcast day in our neighborhood, green leaves finally filling out the space on all the trees, and my eyes settle on a set of very still wind-chimes nestled above the box-These wind woods. chimes, a recent megift, morial were



placed in that precise location in front of my office window, so I might hear them throughout the day, to quiet my mind. But, lately...they are very still. Quiet all on their own.

"And what I've learned through the last 127 days is that...grief is love."

That quietness feels like an exclamation point to my Pastor Corey thoughts lately. reached out a couple weeks ago and asked if I might write something for the church newsletter. "Of course, sure!" I responded. I am typically an open book and try and live a life with complete transparency. Some might even say I'm seldom short on words. But now, here I sit, literally at the last minute...searching for thoughts to share and all I hear is... quiet.

The truth is, I don't know what to write.

Of course, I want to say "thank you." Of course, I want to share the heartfelt gratitude our family feels for this amazing community of people coming together the way they did. Friends, family, strangers - these beautiful, loving and caring hearts that took the time to organize an event so quickly; and who encouraged others to participate, and who took time out of their lives to honor a teenage girl from across the nation most had never even met before or maybe just briefly knew on the outer edges, perhaps just as a very young child years ago. Believe me, when I say...our gratitude is endless and your actions are so humbling to us.

I will be very honest. It took me a while to gather the courage to look through the photos of the Sunshine in Motion event. Each time I sat down to peek through the online album, I would see all those faces...oh my...so many faces. We moved away from the Palouse area right when Davis was born - February of 2001. So these were faces we hadn't seen in years. People we knew from our early marriage, people whose faces stunned me, extended family, acquaint-ances, people that surely had forgotten us after all these years...even faces we'd never met before. I mean, we expected people back home had heard about the accident, likely felt a moment of sadness for our family, maybe even sent a card, and then of course, moved on with their daily lives. But, so many people actually took time out of their own lives to be right there together, with us in spirit, with our daughter in spirit, walking or running in her name, 2,027 miles away from us in my husband's home town.

I've got to tell you, for me personally, looking at that album, seeing each photo of each face...it completely over-whelmed me. It was as if each one, each recognition of the person, brought about something, some THING that forced the breath out of me, pulling oxygen up out of my lungs, taking the color from my complexion, and filling my eyes with unending tears. I recognized that feeling.

It was the same feeling I get when I walk into her room.

It's overwhelming grief.

And what I've learned through the last 127 days is that....

Grief is love!

Our grief is not limited to the love we felt for Davis just while she was alive here on earth. Imagine, if you can, the love we felt for her while she was alive and right here daily with us. Then, imagine that love as a circle surrounding her and us both. It was never ending, but we were all encompassed by and in it. It would just fill and fill and expand and expand, getting larger and larger, growing and growing with each special moment.

But, grief...ahhh...grief is all the other love that you didn't know existed - it's the love on the outside of that circle, and maybe instead of just a circle, it's that the circle is more like a balloon. And one night, without warning and despite your best efforts to protect and keep the balloon intact, it pops. And all the love, that you didn't even know was there in that space on the outside - a space without boundaries, time or distance - comes rushing over you like a wave, rolling you around and around. And it just keeps going on...forever.

It's the love you didn't know you felt...it's the love you had vet to show.

It's the love you feel from people who share in your heartache.

It's the love you feel from Christ, connected to Him through his own death and life.

I realize now when I am overcome with sorrow, when I can't breathe, when I can do nothing more than weep, Christ is right beside me and He is weeping right along with me. He sends others, like you, to shoulder some of those tears and hold me upright and to share in the heartache across the miles and through the years.

So, in my quietness today...in the stillness of those wind chimes right outside out my window, apparently, I do know what to write.

Thank you.

And may God bless this community and this church and all of the young lives who will meet Christ for the very first time because of the camp scholarships funds raised from the Sunshine in Motion race. May those young people begin a relationship with Jesus so that when the day comes and their own balloon pops, which it will, one way or another... they too understand, Jesus is right there, waiting with open arms, loving, welcoming, and even weeping with them.

Grief is Love. And love has no boundaries.

EXTENDING LIFE -EXTENDING HOPE

Our friends from Uganda stared at the snow-covered ski slope on Mt. Spokane, WA, with wonder. Since it was May, the snow was not the Christmas-card quality we might want for someone's first experience of snow, but it, appar-

ently, was enough. The journey to Mt.
Spokane and the state of Washington by way of Memphis,
TN, was a journey of healing, life, and hope for Martin,
Mary, and Praise Kisimba, including making new friends, and meeting old friends face-to-face for the first time.

The journey began with a diagnosis for little three-year old Praise of a congenital heart defect that caused her to be sick and weak. Through the Gift of Life Mid-South organization, Praise and her parents were flown to Memphis, TN, on March 12 where they discovered Praise had measles, delaying surgery until April 9. Through the support of Rotary Club of Memphis and the Rotary Club of East Memphis, the Kisimbas were well-supported and shepherded through the process by Christine Pascus, Rotarian Volunteer and Gift of Life Board Member. A Gift of Life Volunteer, MaryAnn Overman, was an important member in the family's support, offering meals, shopping, sightseeing, and packing eight suitcases for their trip home, a daunting task recognized by any world traveler. During my visit in Memphis, MaryAnn also invited Praise and I for Praise's first Easter Egg Hunt. As we left for the hunt, Praise said something to her parents that made them laugh. I asked what she said, and they replied, "I'll bring you some chickens."

So how did they end up in Washington state, you might ask? How did they end up visiting a small church in a small rural farming community, 90 miles south of Spokane, close to Pullman, WA, the home of Washington State University? Ah, that's a God-breathed story well worth telling again

and again. A WSU college student, whose family lived in Palouse and attended Palouse Federated Church (PFC), was sent to Uganda as part of her degree program in 2009. Her soil-sampling equipment stranded in customs, Alana Brunner Hunter had time to explore Uganda and make Christian friends. Returning back to the USA, she expe rienced some unsettling circumstances: her father had a stroke, and she discovered she had glioblastoma and began cancer treatments as a young college student.

But she never forgot her friends in Uganda. Following her treatment and a time of recovery, Alana returned to Uganda in 2012 with an-

other church member, Angie Cochran. They met Martin and his first wife, Katali, who, much later, died from high blood pressure the day after giving birth to Praise. Because of this meeting, Alana learned about their school, orphanage, and ministry to orphans in a small village about fourteen miles from Jinja, Uganda. Alana and Angie lived with them for several weeks, returning home to Palouse, WA, presenting our small church in Palouse with their need and asking how we might partner with that ministry half a world away.

And partner we have. From that beginning have come other trips to Uganda by PFC members in 2015 and again at the end of 2016. During the last trip in December 2016, PFC members carried Christmas boxes for each child and staff at the Hope 4 All Children Ministry which were provided specif-



ically for them, by name, by other church members. For some children, this was the first Christmas gift they had ever received. One trip, in 2012, friends of PFC carried funds to purchase additional land that had become available. In 2015, the church sent funds to build new latrines since a local health inspector judged theirs as inadequate.

With the help of Living Water International, in 2014, a borehole (well) was drilled that provided the small ministry with clean, safé water, an essential need in Africa. Pastor Martin has faithfully shared this water with the community surrounding them. All manner of children and adults arrive daily at the well to carry away water in a variety of containers, by a variety of means. In 2018, PFC paid for the repairs to the well. Throughout the years of support, money was provided by PFC members to build and, later, finish, a home for Pastor Martin and his chil-dren, and, later, his new wife, Mary, and her children.

PFC has continued to send monthly support to buy food, medicine, clothing, and pay education fees for older children. The ministry in Uganda provides about 80 meals a day to help feed children from the surrounding poor community. Their small, underprovisioned elementary school educates children from the community for free. Beginning in 2017, church members paid for teacher's college for one young man who has taught at the school since the ministry started, first mentored by Martin's first wife, herself a teacher. For just \$300 a term, an amount totally out of reach for most Ugandans, he

will soon receive his teacher's certificate along with the huge amount of hope that began when someone offered to pay his tuition. Mary remarked on the change in him because of this hope, because he had a renewed purpose and saw himself as someone worth investing in.

While the Gift of Life organization surely extended Praise's life, as they have for many other children, other efforts have extended hope through relationships, through support, and God-given provision. As one church member remarked, even though we can't help everyone in Africa, we can help this one small orphanage ministry to which God has connected us.

Martin, Mary, and Praise will return home to Uganda to resume their lives after two months away. They will face the daily hardships and dilemmas that we are spared as Americans. Yet, they have many future hopes and dreams: building more adequate school space, providing food for more children, sending more students to secondary school and college, building something lasting in their corner of the

As Pastor Martin packed an empty juice container with snow to take with him from Mt. Spokane that day in May, I tried to tell him it would melt, but he insisted. As we arrived at our dinner location some time later, he was laughing with Mary. He said he wanted to take the snow to Uganda, but it

had already started melting on that short journey, and he was laughing at himself; it hadn't made it very We live worlds apart, both in terms of culture and experience, but life and hope, no matter how they come, are essential to all of us, and stretch further than a bit of ice.

Going into college scared me because of all of the stories and statistics about Christians walking away from their faith when they made the transition from high school. I've heard more stories



numan on this planet. He is an imperfect man, a sinner just like me. I began to think about what Robinson Cano must be feeling. Yes, he had gotten caught breaking rules and now he must be punished, but something more than that is going on too. He let down a whole lot of people. Thousands of children, and plenty of adults, were heartbroken to hear of Cano's suspension. In a very small way, I can relate to Robinson Cano.

Last month we celebrated Mother's Day and I have to tell you that no Mother's Day comes around without bringing me a significant amount of guilt. While celebrating mothers and talking about how awesome they are, I cannot help but think I do not measure up as a mother. People tell stories

of what amazing lengths their mothers went to and I always think, "my poor kids." Earlier in the school year, my daughter was chosen student-of-the-month. They interviewed her and asked who her hero was and she said it was her mom (awe!!!). I felt proud and terrified at the same time. While I love the fact that, at times, my daughter actually likes me, I do not feel as though I deserve to be any-

one's hero. In the words of Josephine March from the book *Little Women*, "I am afraid I am hopelessly flawed." I am guessing that as Father's Day approaches there will be plenty of dads feeling the exact same way.

Maybe your hero is a professional athlete, actor or musician. Maybe your hero is your grandmother, high school math teacher or a parent. It doesn't really matter who your hero is, they all have a few things in common. They are human. They will fail. They have flaws. They are a sinner. If you are wondering if your hero measures up, Romans 3:23 answers that question.

It tells us that all have sinned, every person falls short. No one is perfect. But, there is some really good news here! You don't have to be perfect to be someone's hero. You can have a hero too! You can have someone you look to, admire and want to be like even though they aren't perfect!

This is why I can relate so easily to the mini-series Pastor Corey is preaching on imperfect heroes. On

Mother's day he focused on Sarah, the wife of Abraham—mother of the Jewish people. Though she was imperfect and at times filled with doubt, God chose to use her to birth His chosen people. On Father's Day we will study my favorite group of imperfect heroes—the 12 disciples. Though they had seen Jesus heal many people and perform super-human miracles they lacked the faith necessary to heal a demonpossessed boy. They failed at the task Jesus had given them. They couldn't get it done, didn't have enough faith. But man, oh man, did God ever go on to use those men. After the resurrection of Christ, these 11 men (along with some very faithful women) spent the rest of their lives spreading the good news of Jesus Christ. More than 2,000 years later, I am sitting here writing about Jesus because God chose to use imperfect people.

The bad news is that none of us are perfect, not you, not me, not your father or mother or mine, not Robinson Cano, Sarah or Jesus' own disciples. The good news is that God can use us anyway. Don't put the burden of "perfection" on any human. But if you do—prepare to be disappointed. God alone is perfect. He also is creative and supremely good. Be alert and watch Him use the imperfect to do the extraordinary.

TONY KETTEL SKATE PARK OPENS

After 17 years, thousands of volunteer service hours and more than \$121,000 in private fundraising efforts, Palouse Skatepark, Inc. will open the Palouse Skatepark to the public on June 2. An opening ceremony at 9 AM will recognize donors and key volunteers, fol-



lowed by a "learn to skateboard, skate, and use the park," lesson until noon. At the noon whistle, the park will open to the general public.

Learn to Skateboard, Skate & Use the Park Lesson Follows

Opens to Public Noon

In many ways, this has been a unique DIY effort. Most skateparks are built with public dollars using state and city funding on city-owned property. However, few skateparks are created on private property then opened to the public, as our project will be! After the generous donation of the property by Tony Kettel and her family, the Palouse skatepark was built entirely through grassroots fundraising, private donations, and a grant from the Tony Hawk Foundation.

Our project was also unusual because the vast majority of the park was built by volunteers, most of whom are skateboarders from outside of Palouse. They worked in the rain, snow, and blistering heat over the last three years to finish the park. Groups of students from the Gar-Pal FFA have cleared debris, organized construction materials, and landscaped. Team members are working to transform the plateau directly above the Palouse Skatepark into a demonstrative community, known as the "Tony Kettel Skate Gardens," and also are landscaping around the skate features below.

The park includes a grain auger, serving as a "pole jam" for advanced skaters as well as the large bowl, a smaller "Koi pond," banks, a granite ledge, manual pad, and a three-tiered skate-able amphitheater next to rolling concrete below a large piece of columnar basalt. The terms of use signage are mounted onto an old Barbershop Pole from historic downtown Palouse.

Skateboarders, skaters, and scooters will be able to roll through the entire park from end to end, but riders must learn their limitations and children must be supervised. It is a "use at your own risk" facility, and visitors are asked to be respectful of other users and the park itself. Motorized vehicles and bikes are not allowed. Helmets and pads are strongly encouraged, and spectators and passersby must be alert as the area is for recreational use. Palouse Skatepark, Inc. is extremely proud of the facility, and hopes that it will be a place for great memories. Skateparks are spaces where newcomers are welcomed and often mentored by experienced riders. Spectators and riders from near and far will drive to visit the park and bring business to local shops and restaurants.

We wish to thank everyone who supported the project both financially and through volunteer labor. With the generous donation of land, time, and money, this dream has become a reality. Thank you, also, to the organizers of the Knuckle SkrapeR's Spring BBQ and Hot Rod Gathering for sharing the day of their downtown event with our grand opening on June 2! We hope to see you at the park soon.

There is no automatic pilot for being a

It's easy to opt out as a dad, it's common to parent in anger, but God's calling fathers to step up as a spiritual teacher and example in the family.

I don't say that last sentence lightly. I'm not on a pedestal of perfection as a dad. Being a consistent spiritual teacher at home, and parenting with loving discipline is something that doesn't come natural for me. I need God's help daily. I need scriptures like Ephesians 6:4 and others that call me to be a healthy parent, and convict me to live out my role as a spiritual teacher of my children.

If you are a dad and you are reading this, and you feel like you are far from being a true spiritual teacher to your own child/children, I'd love to talk and pray with you. First, you are not alone. Second, every day is opportunity to personally grow in Christ and learn how to grow spiritually as a dad. God didn't screw up when he made you a dad. He's got a good plan for you.

Consider these first steps:

- Reach out to a Christian dad that's older than you and just talk about being a dad. They will be receptive and helpful.
- If you don't already <u>pray for your kids daily</u>, start today. Also, find a time to <u>pray with them</u> daily. If this is outside your comfort zone- good! Do it anyways.
- Consider a Bible study reading plan on the Bible App related to being a healthy father. Read the Bible daily. You can't teach what you don't know.
- Consider joining up with a group of Christian men for study, prayer and fellowship.

For those older Dads out there with grown children, or others reading this who aren't dads:

Will you join me in praying for Dads raising children in our area? Will you pray daily for a dad you know is struggling with parenting? Will you consider being a source of encouragement to a younger parent out there?



Me and some of my Christian brothers have a vision that God is working one by one to reach and restore fathers spiritually in our area. We have been blessed to see some Dads have their life radically reoriented around Christ. It can and does happen- because we have the One True Good, Good Father who loves all His children.


