





WHAT A BEAUTIFUL NAME

Names are important. Everyone who has ever had their name mispronounced in public knows the irritating feeling of being called by the wrong name. When speaking or receiving recognition I've been introduced as Jim



and even Kim. And my favorite mispronunciation of my last name is "Sleevers." And I know many of you have it even worse than me.

Names are important because they form part of our identity. I've always loved that my parents chose to name me after the Apostle Paul's coworker Timothy who accompanied him on his missionary journeys and helped get the early church off to a good start. And I've always loved that my name means. Timothy is the English form of the Greek name Timoθeog (Timotheos) meaning "honoring God," derived from Timo (timao) "to honour" and θeog (theos) "god."

I also have a few nicknames, as I suppose you do too. My wife calls me "Bear," which I hope is a term of endearment and not a description of my attitude and behavior. When I was younger, one of my aunts gave me the nickname of "Timmers." She even had a Christmas ornament engraved with the name made for me. I've never really liked that nickname, but even though she has passed on, it follows me still - as I hang that ornament on the tree each year and as my mom, my wife, or other relatives still use it on occasion.

"When we had nothing - he was our everything and we never were lacking!" Did you know that beyond Father, Son and Holy Spirit, the Bible has more than 80 names for God? Studying the names of God can reveal to us aspects of his character and his nature. By studying God's name we learn to honor him (Exodus 20:7); we are reminded of his greatness (Psalm 8:1); we can benefit from the protection provided by his name (Proverbs 18:10); and we can grow our faith (Psalm 9:10).

The Old Testament story of Abraham and Isaac from Genesis 22 reveals one of God's names and an important part of God's character. The story begins with a strange command from God to Abraham that he is to give his "son of promise," Isaac as an offering to the Lord. After battling infertility, Abraham and Sarah in their old age gave birth to Isaac who was the means through which God would fulfill his promise to make Abraham the father of many nations. Hebrews 11:11-12, remembers Abraham and Sarah's story this way:

By faith Sarah herself received power to conceive, even when she was past the age, since she considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one man, and him as good as dead, were born descendants as many as the stars of heaven and as many as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.

But that promise was threatened by God's new command to Abraham: "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love...and offer him there as a burnt offering..."

As Abraham and Isaac travel to Moriah and approach the place God revealed to him, the unknowing Isaac asks of his father, "...where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" With great faith, and with foresight unbeknownst to him, Abraham responds: "God will provide for himself the lamb..."

Upon reaching the place God had chosen, in an act of great faith and true obedience, Abraham readied an altar, bound Isaac and placed him upon the altar on top of the wood. Abraham reached for his knife and prepared to slaughter his son. And at the climax of the story, with Abraham prepared to kill his own son and bring an end to his promised future, the angel of the Lord called to him and stayed Abraham's hand, thus sparing Isaac's life. The act reveals Abraham's

character as a man who fears God. And when Abraham lifts his eyes and looks behind him, there he sees a ram stuck in the thicket by its horns. Instead of Isaac, Abraham offers the ram as a sacrifice to God and he names the place, "The Lord will provide," Jehovah Jireh - thus revealing the character of God as provider.

"Abraham's statement foreshadows God's ultimate sacrifice of his own son, Jesus!"

"The Lord will provide," not the "the Lord did provide." Abraham's proclamation doesn't simply memorialize a past event, it anticipates a future action - the Lord will provide. Abra-

tion - the Lord will provide. Abraham's statement foreshadows God's ultimate sacrifice of his own son, Jesus, of whom, John the Baptist proclaimed: "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29)

Just as the Lord provides for Abraham he provides for us. He provides salvation even today to those who turn from sin and choose him. And he continually provides for our spiritual and material needs as well.

The truth is, provision isn't something we think about often...at least not for those of us who have, and let's face it, that's most of us. But, there are people in our world, in our community, people who are our neighbors who have not. It's hard for us who have even to see those who have not. We don't see the widow at the food bank, because we don't go to the food bank. We don't see the family desperately trying to scrape by asking for help on the corner because we're drinking deep from our designer coffees or our faces are buried in our phones as we are consumed with satisfying the "needs" of me.

While I've not stood on the corner with a sign pleading for help, I have been the guy at the food bank. I know what it is to lose your job and your livelihood and your reputation. I know what it is to lose your home and everything you worked for. I also know what it's like to have God provide... everything. In my darkest hour, God provided food from caring friends, a safe and accepting place to worship, and a home to live in while we waited to see what God would do and where he would send us.

As I reflect on my own life, the story of Abraham and Isaac challenges me in two ways today. First, it challenges me to recognize and give thanks to God for being the God who provides - Jehovah Jireh. He provides salvation and he provides for our everyday needs. And his provision is abundant! When we had nothing - he was our everything and we never were lacking! Second, it challenges me to open my eyes to see those who have not - to see...and to act. Sometimes we are God's plan to provide for his people.

My encouragement to you is to not let your abundance get in the way of seeing how God provides in your life, or how you might help provide for others.

Jehovah Jireh - the Lord will provide - What a beautiful name it is!

As I bring this article to a close, I'm reminded of a song we've been singing in the 11 AM service by the worship band

sing this song, the truth of the lyrics brings me to tears.



A WORD ABOUT COMPASSION

I've been thinking a lot about compassion. What does it mean to have compassion for one another? I believe that compassion begins long before we actually show kindness to someone else. Compassion begins in our heads. Com-



passion colors not just our interactions with others, but our approach to others. Before beginning a conversation with someone do we think about what kind of day they have had? Do we stop to consider what type of challenges they may be facing? Do we think about their physical struggles, their pain level or how much sleep they may have gotten. I would hazard to guess that most of the time our answer is "no." Most of the time, what we think the most about before entering into conversation is ourselves—our goals, our agenda and our needs.

Scripture tells us to put the needs of others before our own and to treat others with kindness and compassion:

"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." ~ Colossians 3:12-13 (ESV)

My hypothesis is that if we went into every conversation, every interaction with compassionate hearts, considering the needs and feelings of the other person, we would enjoy excellent relationships and quality communication with one another.

Gresham says, "When your identity is in what you do, then your most basic life foundation is being built upon something shakable...there's nothing worse than finding out that you've built your life on something that can be taken away in an instant. Your identity is NOT in what you do. It's in who you are."

So where is our identity? Do we identify with Christ in all that we do? Or do we let the worldly things pull us into becoming someone or something that will not last? *Becoming* discusses how we become slaves to sin - listening to the voices of our culture...voices that tell us we aren't enough; and so we are always seeking approval.

We've all been there. Just think back to Junior High and High School and the forces that pulled and pushed you to be "someone." A friend recently told me she always had the feeling in school that she was an "outcast" and never fit in. I felt the same way! I'm in the process of finding out that the only lasting way to find value is to understand who God says I am.

We are all imperfect people but we are not alone! My husband John and I both celebrated our 50-year class reunions this past month, and I'm feeling like I'm really enough to be who I am in Christ - because I'm His Child. I'm trying to listen to what God says about me, not what others say, and especially not what I say about myself.

This has me thinking of our 14 high schoolers who went to Young Life Camp as well as all the kids who went to Ross Point Camp, and how they all have a need to belong. Belonging to Jesus is the best! I've become A CHILD OF GOD. What a wonderful identity! Keep praying for those around you to keep seeking an identity that will last, and keep becoming....a child of God.

HALF A MINUTE TO HELP YOUR HEART

What can we do in a half minute, 30 seconds, that could really make an impact on your heart? In my reading, I recently was reminded of the "Thirty-Seconds Rule," a helpful idea to in-



clude in your daily life to help re-orient our hearts to serving others. This idea is from pastor and author Kevin Harney, he explains it best:

The Thirty-Seconds Rule is a commitment to pause at specific times in the flow of a day to recalibrate our hearts and eyes toward the people around us...It's a chance to say to God, "Here I am. I'm ready to scatter the seed of your gospel. Please use me as a conduit of your living water to help seed grow." (Organic Outreach for Ordinary People, 155)

Here are some natural times to pause and implement the Thirty-Seconds Rule:

- Walking into your workplace or school.
- Entering the home of someone who is not yet a follower of Jesus.
- Engaging in a social setting that involves people who are far from God.
- Walking into a restaurant, store, or other business.
- Driving down the street where you live.
- Entering any place you go on a daily basis.

Harney continues:

The Thirty-Seconds Rule is simply a decision to take your foot off the emotional gas pedal of your day and slow down enough to let the Holy Spirit sensitize your heart to what is happening around you...Will you take 30 seconds, just a few times each day, to recalibrate your heart? If you are willing, God is ready to move in fresh and powerful ways. (Organic Outreach for Ordinary People, 156-158)

Consider pausing for 30 seconds at a time, a few times during your day, and listen to God's Spirit for how you might be used to serve, bless and encourage those in your life. Perhaps it will lead to a phone call, a conversation, an act of service, or a thank you note written. Wherever God leads you with your 30-second prayers, I bet, like me, you'll be glad you tried out this idea.

Creator of the heavens and the earth, you are the ultimate artist. You are creative beyond measure. You have made each person beautiful and unique. If I am to be used by you in this world, I need to be infused with your creative energy. Give me boldness to try new things. Grant me grace when an outreach effort doesn't work and humility when it does. I know you want the seed of your gospel scattered all over the world. Here are my hands and my heart; use me for your glory. Amen. (Organic Outreach for Ordinary People, 160)
