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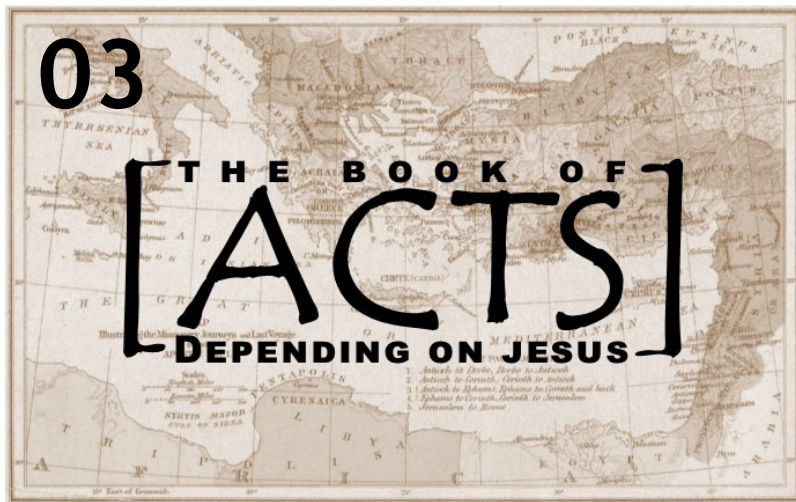
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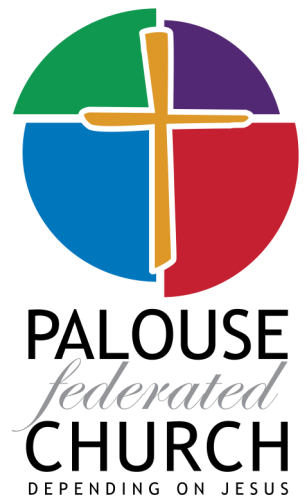


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# LIFE IN THE FAST FORWARD

I am a bit sad to see the season of Christmas go. I love to study the incredible story of the first Christmas. This year at PFC we focused on how “imperfect” the story and each of its characters were. A young woman, publicly shamed and separated from her home and family, giving birth in a scary setting. An honorable man, trying to figure out how to support the unexplainable pregnancy of his betrothed wife. Dirty shepherds daring to believe they witnessed a miracle. I could go on and on. Another thing I love about studying the Christmas story is how I can come to it each time with fresh eyes, seeing parts of the story I hadn’t really focused on before. This happened to me this year toward the end of our Christmas series. While reading in the book of Luke, chapter 2, just after Jesus was presented before Anna and Simeon in the temple, I was struck by these verses:

“<sup>39</sup>And when they had performed everything according to the Law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. <sup>40</sup>And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom. And the favor of God was upon him.”

You could almost summarize verses 39 and 40 as, “Fast forward” to the next part of the story. The story picks up again in verse 41 when Jesus is 12 years old and his family is on their annual trip to the temple. That story is followed in verse 52 with this:

“And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and Man.”

In other words, “fast forward” to Chapter 3 of Luke where the story picks up with 30-year-old Jesus beginning his ministry.

These “summary” verses are intriguing to me. They summarize Jesus’ life between the ages of about 2 and 12 and again from 12-30. I have children in these phases of life



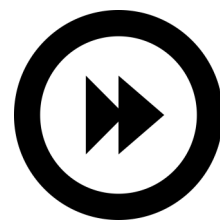
and so I know this: A LOT happened during the “fast forward.” These are not unimportant years in the life of Jesus and His family. We do not have the details of the years. We know virtually nothing about them—except we know a lot. What can we know? We know that everyone did their job. Jesus’ job was to play, to learn, to grow, to respect His earthly parents and His Heavenly Father. He learned His place in the world and in God’s amazing redemptive plan. He learned perseverance, work ethic, diligence, and how to be compassionate, loving and kind. Mary and Joseph had incredibly difficult jobs to do as well.

They nurtured and cared for their son as He grew. They taught Him all the characteristics that defined His life and ministry. They taught Him who he was to become. Finally, they taught Him perhaps the most difficult thing of all: how to leave them and set off on His Father’s path. You can see a beautiful example of Mary gently nudging her son out of the nest in John chapter 2 as she is the one who encourages Him to perform His first public miracle.

As I reflected on the reality of the “fast forward” passages in the Gospel, I couldn’t help but think that my children are in the middle of their “fast forward” years as well. As mundane as life can sometimes feel, this is not

the time to put it on cruise control. There is important work to accomplish during these years. We each have a very important job to do. Honestly, my job, like yours, isn’t that different from Jesus’. We play, we learn, we grow, we love and respect others as we find God’s place for us in His world, joining Him on His mission. Let each one of us take the time to realize the importance of each of our days. Each one is precious and meaningful. Jesus would not have been ready to accomplish His Father’s mission without the fast forward years. What mission is God preparing you for in your fast forward?

## ACTS STUDY COMING TO A CLOSE

We have been journeying through the book of Acts on Sunday mornings for years now! The journey will soon come to an end as we are quickly approaching the book's final chapters. I thought I would take this opportunity to reflect, in a general way, about what I have learned about Christ, His Church, and our mission as I preached through this book.



**Christ** - Jesus Christ ascends to heaven in the very first chapter of Acts. And yet, one of the big things I learned is that Jesus is present in every bit of the ongoing story. The body of Jesus Christ is present throughout the whole book. His Body is the Church; His believers are His people. Christ is the hero of Acts!

**His Church** - Though Jesus Christ is the hero of the book, His people do quite heroic work enabled by the Spirit. Philip's witness to an Ethiopian, Stephen's martyr death, the persecution of Paul, and the leadership of James are all examples of Christ followers who demonstrate Christlikeness. We are His Church when we trust in Him and act like Him.

**Our Mission** - A lot has changed since the 1<sup>st</sup> Century, but the mission is the same—we are called to bear witness of Jesus Christ and His good news to the “ends of the earth” (Acts 1:8). We don't have to deal with the Roman Empire, or Greek idol makers, but we still do share our faith in a world that is not readily receptive to Christ's life-changing message.

We have journeyed to the end of the book of Acts, but the “Acts of the Holy Spirit” are not yet done - and God's story of His Church is still being written. Amen.

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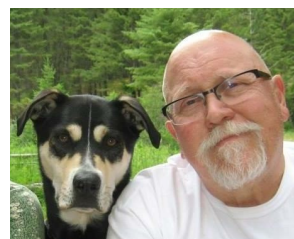

## LOCKED OUT

This past year we have made several safety and security related changes here at Palouse Federated Church. Look around on a Sunday morning and you will see several of them while others you won't see.



Take a walk around the back of the building and you will see we have a new solid door and secure lock on the basement's rear exit. We had concrete work done to save the crumbling concrete on the stairs and base at the Fellowship Hall's rear exit. This will stop the deterioration of that area and allow us to use de-icer and reduce potential falls. We have added an AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) to use in the case of a cardiac event and we



have lots of people that are currently trained on its use. We check-in children as they head to Sunday School and let the teachers know who the responsible person is that will pick them up. We also have added an alert system to be used if we ever have an active assailant situation.

There is one more change that will be happening as soon as we get the word around - WE ARE CHANGING THE DOOR LOCKS - YOUR KEYS WILL NO LONGER WORK. Sorry to shout,

but we need to know who needs access when the building is locked so we can arrange access for you. Currently, we have far too many keys roaming the town. We are moving to a keyless lock system and will no longer be using keys. We will issue access codes similar to a PIN (Personal Identification Number). It is important that if you are needing access on a regular basis that you contact the church to arrange for an access code. We will be making an access list and pass out codes later in February before the locks are installed. We also will make a short video on how to use them, and/or do one-on-one training.

Having a keyless system will allow us to arrange one-time access for outside groups that have rented the church without the expense of having a key made. We can provide a code to repair people without having to have someone physically at the building. This new system will be easy to use and will allow us to keep our building secure when it needs to be secure. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this time of change. These changes will increase the safety and security of the building as well as the safety and security of you and your family.

# MY LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

Back in 1985, I had three children all under the age of 5. My dad had recently been diagnosed with brain cancer and I got really sick. I was dizzy all the time (the room always spinning). I could not sleep or eat, and I had horrific migraine headaches. And to top it all off, I couldn't find any help at all for any of it.

I was shuffled between doctors and tested for a variety of things with no conclusive results. The doctors had me diagnosed with anything from Epstein-Barr virus, to thyroid problems and there were several "I don't knows." After a year of chasing answers, I finally was referred to a doctor of internal medicine (Doctor #4), who examined me, read my file and put a word to my suffering - "depression."

As I look back and reflect on that time, depression was not talked about very much even with doctors. People often would tell me to just pick myself up and move on. The doctor put me on a depression medicine that was also used

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for migraines and about six months later, I finally started to feel better. Unfortunately, nobody really kept track of me and I remained on that medicine for years. I was not sick like I was before, but I really didn't feel like myself either. I was not even sure who I was supposed to be anymore. I weaned myself from those pills and slowly added church and God back into my life, and as time passed, I felt stronger.

That time in my life I call my "pit moment." I was spiritually lost. As I added regular worship and fellowship into my life, I truly felt

better than I had in years. Depression is real. It can make you very sick and can ruin lives. And depression sometimes stays with you - it is something I have battled with off and on since the diagnosis.

My "pit moment" reminded me of battling with Satan constantly. Through the years, whenever I felt like Satan was tapping my shoulder, I would pray to God. My prayers were always thankful and included the Lord's Prayer. After a while, when Satan would tap, I would say out loud: "In the name of Jesus Christ - be gone." As I said before, worship and fellowship helped a lot - but praying was what made me feel the best. I now make it a habit to pray all day long - no matter what I'm going through.

Right now, I feel better than I ever have. My relationship with God is what saved me out of depression. I am not on anti-depressants and feel well. I put all my faith in God and talk to him daily. I focus my thoughts on the Lord and my actions should speak to that.

I don't want to discourage anyone facing depression from using medicine to help. Medicine has its place and helped me a great deal on my journey. But turning back to God is what has really helped my heart, soul and mind.

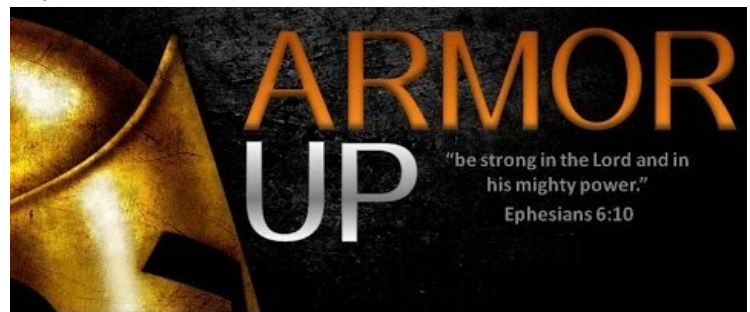


Depression awareness is important. And sometimes, we can see depression in someone before they themselves do. Left undiagnosed or even unspoken, depression can lead to detrimental consequences.

Unspoken depression can result in suffering through life. One can feel as though they suffer alone - not knowing what is wrong - just knowing something is. I want to encourage you that if you feel depressed, it doesn't matter how strong you think you are - you can't just pull yourself up by the boot straps. Don't be afraid to talk with a friend, a doctor, a professional counselor (this helped me a lot), or your pastor and find help.

And if you suspect someone you know is experiencing depression, don't be afraid to talk to them about it. At my son Dylan's memorial service, I took time to speak to the kids in the church about the importance of paying attention to others, striking up a conversation, asking what's wrong and truly listening. Sometimes it's our job to take notice and action when we see our friends and family experiencing depression. Don't let the fear and risk of taking that uncomfortable first step of checking in and saying the word keep you from doing so. The people we love are too important to ignore their suffering.

## OFF THE SHELF

A REVIEW OF: THE PRODIGAL PROPHET

The best book I have ever read about the Bible character Jonah is Tim Keller's *The Prodigal Prophet* (Viking, 2018). I want to encourage you to read this book as we explore Jonah in the coming weeks.

Jonah was a prophet that ran from God. Only when faced with his own death, and the death of the sailors on the boat he was on, did he admit his choice to run was causing problems. But even in throwing himself into the sea, he was not giving in to preaching to Nineveh as God called him to do.

Keller skillfully points out that Jonah is like both sons in the Prodigal Son story of Luke 15. Jonah is like the son that ran away, but he also is like the son who obeys his father, but was bitter and lost in his self-righteousness. Keller points out that Jonah put his nationalism and race as idols - they had become more important to him than it was to share God's mercy. Jonah didn't want God to forgive the foreign Ninevites. But he went to Nineveh, and God used his half-hearted sermon to cause repentance in the King of Nineveh and his subjects. This story of Jonah, and Keller's description of it, has much to teach us about the mercy of God and gives us a convicting look at what might be hindering us from sharing the Father's mercy with others.

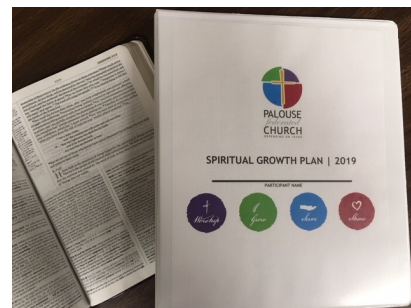

Its primary purpose will be to send food home with kids who have indicated a need. The free and optional supplemental weekend food program will provide a bag of food every Friday or the day before an extended weekend/holiday to ensure kids have access to healthy food while away from school. The pantry may also be used for elementary students who don't have daytime snacks and for high school athletes who could benefit from a healthy snack before practice.

The pantry will operate by donation. Donated items can be delivered to the Palouse School during school hours or to Palouse Federated Church, where there are collection boxes both inside and outside the building.
