



REFLECTIONS ON ACTS

We've been studying the book of Acts on Sunday mornings in our series, "Depending on Jesus." As the series comes to a close the first Sunday in March, Pastor Corey encouraged the congregation to reflect on some of the lessons learned through our study. Here are the submissions we received:

When There is a Truck-sized Opening to Share My Faith Betty Sawyer

An 8-year-old asked me, "Grandma, do you believe in God?" "Yes, Miles, I do," I replied. He went on, "Do you think God is real?"

As I stood there doing dishes, I thought, "what is this little guy really asking?" I prayed a quick arrow prayer for the right words. What do you say to an 8-year-old little boy who asks the most important question in the universe?

"That's a great question," I replied. "There's a guy in the Bible who even said, 'our belief [preaching] is in vain and our message is worthless' if we don't believe in God [and Jesus raised from the dead.] I probably messed up the words, but I wanted this young man to know it was ok to ask questions, and other great men have asked lots of questions in the past.

I went on, "In the Bible this guy, Paul, found out there really is a God. He met him on the road to Damascus, where he saw Jesus and was blinded for three days. Have you heard that story? He believed, because he was healed and really knew, and saw for real, that there was God."

And off ran the little guy, evidently ok with my answer.

Studying Acts has shown me more about letting the Holy Spirit guide me to share the good news. All of Paul's suffering and imprisonment helped Paul grow in faith so he could write all those profound letters which make up so much of our New Testament. It's encouraged me to share my faith with others in word and deed.

And God sends us opportunities to share, like Paul had while in prison. My opportunity came on the feet of a little boy. It was a "truck sized opening" where God helped me share the good news that HE is real.

Faith is Everything Tim Sievers

As I reflect on our journey through Acts, I am struck by Paul's faith - his trust in God. When confronted by angry mobs - faith. When on trial with his life weighing in the balance - faith. Shipwrecked at sea - faith. Imprisoned in Rome, Caesarea or Philippi - faith.

Nothing shook Paul's faith in God and that trust helped him stay on mission and spread the Good News. Paul's faith kept him from fear and despair. Paul's faith allowed him to be a conduit of the Gospel in every situation he encountered. And because of Paul's faith - the Gospel spread through all the ancient world.

Paul truly *Depended on Jesus*. His faith challenges me today. The circumstances I face are no match for what Paul experienced, and yet, I'm nowhere near as bold in proclaiming the Good News about Jesus. What's stopping me? What's stopping you?

Lord, help us to Depend on Jesus. Increase our faith that we may boldly and with humility share the Good News with our world today. Amen.

There are so many examples of heroes in the book of Acts but one that has always stood out to me is Barnabas. We hear of him first in Acts 4:36-37 -

Thus Joseph, who was also called by the apostles Barnabas (which means son of encouragement), a Levite, a native of Cyprus, sold a field that belonged to him and brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet.

The next we hear of him is in Acts 9:26-27 -

(this has to do with Paul being accepted by the Apostles) And when he had come to Jerusalem, he attempted to join the disciples. And they were all afraid of him, for they did not believe that he was a disciple. But Barnabas took him and brought him to the apostles and declared to them how on the road he had seen the Lord, who spoke to him, and how at Damascus he had preached boldly in the name of Jesus.

For me personally, Barnabas is a hero. He had to have a deep trusting relationship with the Lord for him to bring Paul before the Apostles. For in fact, Paul had been the main persecutor of the followers of Christ. Barnabas acted outside the box and gave the world Paul - the greatest orator, preacher and writer of the things pertaining to Christ our Lord.

Saul was a bad man. Selfish, prideful and power hungry, it seemed he would stop at nothing to climb the political ladder. But then he met Jesus. Everything changed for Paul that day on the road to Damascus. Life as he had known it was over and he had to decide where to go from there. Many of us can relate to Paul. We think we have our life plan all laid out but then we meet Jesus and everything changes. The changes Paul made were incredibly difficult, painful, and dangerous, but obedience to God became the guiding light in Paul's life. All things became new for Paul and the world changed because of it. God is still using the obedience of Paul to guide people to him 2,000 years later. Doing what is best isn't always easiest and the easiest road is seldom the best road. God never abandoned Paul as he walked his difficult road and He won't abandon you or I either.

Why is our next book of the Bible Jonah for Sunday sermons?

Jonah is a great, relatively short, Old Testament book with many lessons to teach us.

This book is important for people in our culturally divisive times to read. Jonah didn't want to go and preach God's mercy to his enemies. There were definitely reasons for Jonah to not want to minister to Nineveh. But God loves both us and those who oppose us. God is calling His people, much like He called Jonah, to move towards our "enemies" and not run from them.

Jonah is very imperfect, he is very different from Jesus. But through his imperfections we can see our own need for Jesus. Jonah is reflection of broken humanity. I hope you will dive in to our Jonah series.

Please consider reading the short book of Jonah multiple times, hopefully once a week, as we journey through this season. Each time you read it pray that God will teach you something you need to real. In large transfer of the last transfer away from the Jonah series! Unless you really like fish.



KINDNESS FOR KIDS **FOOD PANTRY DONATIONS**

Under the leadership and direction of Jayne Oleson and with the help of community volunteers, a food pantry has been established at the Palouse School. Its primary purpose is to send food home with kids who have indicated a need. The free and optional supplemental weekend food program provides a bag of food every Friday or the day before an extended weekend/holiday to ensure kids have access to healthy food while away from school. The pantry also is used for elementary students who don't have daytime snacks and for high school athletes who could benefit from a healthy snack before practice.

The pantry operates by donation. Donated items can be delivered to the Palouse School during school hours or to Palouse Federated Church, where there are collection boxes both inside and outside the building. Financial donations are welcome and will provide dairy items along with fresh fruit and vegetables. Please make checks payable to Kindness for Kids and deliver to the Palouse School office.

LOVE IS DANGEROUS

Sometimes I don't want to love my enemies. Are you shocked? First of all, yes-I do have enemies. I am guessing you do too. It matters how we define enemies. An enemy is someone who wishes me evil or tries to make my life difficult...just for fun. So I have enemies—and so do you. It's really difficult to actively love someone who wishes you harm, but that is what God has called us to do.



First of all—it doesn't seem fair. Someone wants to hurt me and I am supposed to show them love? How is that fair? Well the truth is, it isn't fair. It is merciful. God knows that practicing this type of mercy, showing love is actually good for us. By the way, it is good for our enemy too.

I think about my enemies every March. I love Saint Patrick's Day-for a couple of reasons. 20 years ago, this Saint Patrick's Day, I left for a mission trip to Ireland. It was amazing—life changing in so many ways. The other reason I love Saint Patrick's Day is the story of Saint Patrick himself. What an amazing example of someone who loved his enemies. A young Patrick was kidnapped from his home in France and taken to the heathen Island of Ireland. He was held captive and forced to be a slave. At some point, through miraculous means, he escaped his captors and returned to his family and his homeland. But then, Patrick was compelled by God to return to Ireland and bring the good news of Jesus Christ to that Godless land. Largely due to Patrick's efforts, many of the Irish repented and turned to God.

What incredible faith it must take to listen to a call from God like Patrick's. Of course, it is always difficult to show love. When we love someone, we are always making ourselves vulnerable. What if they don't accept our love? What if they reject us? In Patrick's case, his life was literally in danger. Love is always dangerous—but it is worth it. Our love may not be reciprocated, and we may not see the "pay off" this side of glory, but God knows what is best for us. Obedience to Him doesn't always come with a tangible reward.

As long as we live in a fallen word, stained by sin, you and I will have enemies. There will be powers and forces out to get us. They want to see us turn from our convictions and retaliate hate for hate, evil for evil. Following Christ means fighting against this temptation. We don't fight hate with hate but with love. Love your enemies. Bless those who curse you. Throw "fair" out the window—like Saint Patrick.

SCAM ALERT

There has been a rash of scam phone calls lately and the City of Palouse asked us to pass on this alert. Scammers are getting trickier, often times using "ghosted" numbers that look like legitimate businesses or appear to be coming from your local area. Don't be fooled.

Helpful Tips to Identify a Scam:

- Legitimate businesses will NEVER require your credit card, gift cards, debit cards, account numbers, SSN, over the phone. Legitimate businesses will NEVER threaten to have authorities at your door if you don't provide financial compensation. Legitimate sweepstakes will NEVER require an advance so you can receive your "winnings." If you receive any calls that request payment, hang up and call a trusted friend, neighbor, or even City Hall, or the non-emergency Police Department number and someone will help you. But NEVER give any kind of payment until it has been de-
- you. But NEVER give any kind of payment until it has been determined safe by a reliable, trusted source.

 Scammers sometimes mimic a loved one, like a grand-child. Don't fall for it. Hang up and call back your loved one on what you know is their phone number, not the number that just called you.
